



s a committed Christian with a degree in linguistics, but no idea what she wanted to do with her life, Kathy Dadd decided to head to Bolivia.

She enjoyed her six months there but was reluctant about being based so far from Australia. Confronting stories about persecuted Christians which she heard through her work with Christian organisation Open Doors, however, challenged her perspective and drove her to consider full-time ministry.

Acting on her interest in Bible translation, Kathy enrolled in the year-long Wycliffe translation course and was accepted as a Wycliffe member late in 2015. She is now continuing to equip herself for service by studying at Sydney Missionary and Bible College.

The 28-year-old anticipates serving in northern Australia, following a passion for seeing Aboriginal people access the Bible in their heart languages.

aunch (previously SILA Summer School) draws people together from all over the world who are heading into different roles. Amongst this diversity, however, as I reflect on my experiences as both a student and teacher at Launch, I recognise two types of students.

The first is enthusiastic from the outset. Aware of what a difference their learning will make, they are fascinated by the things they learn. They often have high expectations of themselves, but they realise that their mistakes actually help them become better at communicating and building relationships cross-culturally.

The second type is more apprehensive. Perhaps they are only doing the course to fulfil a requirement. Maybe they doubt their language ability. However, as they find their rhythm and things start to click, they actually have fun and surprise themselves. Having patient and encouraging teachers who have themselves served overseas in different roles also makes a huge difference. I love seeing how these people grow over the course of the six weeks.

Both types of people face challenges. Yet both arrive at the end of the course equipped with a new skillset and lasting friendships. If you are heading into cross-cultural ministry, whichever of these two types describe you (and anything in between!) I can't recommend *Launch* highly enough.


ot one single complete

language. And Saul and Rebecca
Thurrowgood are committed to
doing something about it.

Since 2015, Saul has been pioneering a revolutionary computer software program that is set to transform sign language Bible translation as we know it.

In spite of obstacles they faced in mid-2015, Saul shares that a partnership with the Deaf Bible Society is 'opening up doors that otherwise we didn't really see happening.' Rebecca has discovered that the key to getting through times of uncertainty is to 'hold on to knowing that God's doing something.'

With the support of friends and church members, Saul and Rebecca will keep striving to empower sign language Bible translators to put Scripture into the hands and hearts of the Deaf.

Pray for Saul and Rebecca: That God provides another programmer, for the motion capture system they are about to test, and for good relationships with team members despite barriers of distance, time zones, cultures and languages.

ydney couple Toby and MG will soon pack up their home, farewell family and friends, and take their children back to South Asia. They are starting their second term as translation facilitators among the Kungka\* people of South Asia.

Before they took part in a *Probe* (also known as *Wheel*) course, 'Toby didn't think he could do it,' MG shares.

At the end of the week, however, she was the one questioning whether Bible

translation was for her, while Toby was 'seriously considering' it!

God soon assured MG, too, that 'Bible translation isn't just an academic exercise. It's also helping people grow in Christ.'

Adjusting to life in the Kungka community has not been easy for the family, but their faith has been strengthened. 'It's all about relationships,' MG says. 'We don't want to drive our own agenda, but see what God is doing and be led by Him.' Pray for Toby & MG: For God's enabling as their family (including newest member, Trinity) prepares to return to South Asia, that existing relationships on the field will be renewed and strengthened, and for the Kungka translation team.
